Online Seminar: Do (u) remember?

Afterwards there will be enough time to ask questions and discuss the use of holograms in the field of remembrance.

Online Seminar: Antisemitism

This workshop offers educational information about Jewish life in Germany and other countries and how we can fight together against antisemitism. For centuries, the Jewish have been targets of hatred and discrimination, they have struggled to survive (and succeeded!) – even in their darkest years during the Holocaust in Europe. And yet – what do we know about the persecution of Jewish people or why they are being attacked even today? And more importantly: how much do we know about Jewish life?

Online Seminar: Identity Crisis

Examining Questions of Identity in Second Generation Survivors of the Holocaust. This workshop aims to bring light to the entangled and challenging identities of second generation Holocaust survivors by examining their words and art. The first generation (witnesses) who survived the Holocaust almost had their individual identities robbed from them and were often not given the chance to reclaim it after the Second World War ended.

Online Seminar: Nuremberg Trials

The Nuremberg Trial is the first and the most important one in the series of trials that took place at the Nuremberg Palace of Justice after the end of World War II. In our workshop, we will explore and analyze the very first Nuremberg trial along with the subsequent ones. We will learn about the charges, the trial process, the influence of the Nuremberg trials on the international law, as well as study the criticism directed at the process and the outcome of the trials.

Online Seminar: Gender & Sexuality

The aim of this workshop is to provide an introduction into gender and sexuality in the Third Reich, specifically how gender and sexual expressions were restricted under National Socialism. In contrast with the circumstances prior to the Nazi regime, we will discuss the impact of National Socialist ideology and propaganda on German society from gender and family ideals to sexual regulation and abuse. The participants will also be invited to draw parallels between the strict control of the Third Reich and harmful policies in different countries today.
